ROLAND ERNEST "SMOKEY VAL" VALLIERE (1928 - 2016)

Maine Bluegrass lost one of its greatest fiddlers and dobroists, and a true pioneer of Maine Bluegrass, last fall when Roland Ernest Valliere, known in bluegrass circles as Smokey Val, passed away on October 2, 2016 at the age of 88. His



musical career spanned over 60 years, with accomplished stints in traditional country and bluegrass bands like The Rainbow Ramblers; Al Hawkes and the Cumberland Ridge Runners; Tiny Martin and the Countrysiders; Jimmy Cox and "Coastline Charlie" Gilliam and the Blue Mountain Boys; White Mountain Bluegrass; and Mac McHale and the Old Time Radio Gang. During the 1960's, Smokey was a regular on the Ken MacKenzie television show.

During his musical career, Smokey shared the stage with a number of nationally famous stars such as Mac Wiseman and Bill Monroe, and he was inducted, in 2008, into the International Bluegrass Music Museum in Owensboro, Kentucky as a "Pioneer of Bluegrass Music," an honor bestowed on influential first generation bluegrass performers. According to his family, Smokey considered this a major highlight of his career.

Born on May 8,1928 in Biddeford, where he was raised by his French-Canadian parents, Roland Valliere served two terms of duty in the U. S. Army, being stationed in Germany and Austria. He began playing the fiddle in about 1945, while he was still in the army. He married Simone Pruneau in 1954, and they raised three children. Smokey worked for several Biddeford area businesses including the Singer Sewing Machine Company; the Pepperell Mill; Farrar Brown Auto Parts; and Shape, Inc. He was a fine woodworker, and engaged in the repair of guitars, mandolins and fiddles. He also handcrafted his own resonator guitars, and did remarkable mother-of-pearl inlay on instruments.

Smokey Val was a self-taught musician, whose nickname, "Smokey," derived from the fact that when he played Orange Blossom Special, clouds of rosin would rise into the air from his bow.

Predeceased by his wife, Smokey died at home, surrounded by his children. He is survived by two daughters, a son, three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and many cousins, nieces, nephews and friends. His contributions to Maine bluegrass and traditional country music will be remembered, and he will be missed.

SIMON ST. PIERRE (1930 - 2016)

Simon C. St. Pierre, an enormously talented and charismatic fiddler, passed away at the age of 86 in Houlton on July 7, 2016.
Although Simon was primarily a practitioner of the



French Canadian and maritime style of fiddling, having first learning to fiddle in lumber camps and square dances, he was well known to Maine bluegrass audiences as a frequent performer at bluegrass festivals in the 1970's and 1980's and less frequently in the 1990's. On two of his three critically acclaimed Revonah LP albums, he was backed by bluegrass bands — Maine's Fred Pike and Sam Tidwell and the Kennebec Valley Boys, and Walter Hensley and the Dukes of Bluegrass from the Baltimore area.

Born February 26, 1930 in Packington, Quebec, Simon grew up listening to the fiddle playing of his father and an older brother, who was a well-known dance and wedding fiddler in their area. His family also had recordings of Canadian fiddlers; Isidore Soucy made a particularly strong impression. Simon began playing at about the age of 15, the same age that he began working in the woods. In the logging camps, the men were isolated and fiddling was one of the few evening entertainments. In the lumber camps, Simon learned many tunes from other logger-fiddlers, and he noticed the differences that distinguished Quebec tunes from Ontario tunes and Nova Scotia tunes. Simon learned them all, and began to develop his own style.


Simon married Simone Fradette in 1952, and they worked as independent sawmill operators. They moved to northern Maine in 1957, where Simon continued to work as a logger, while he continued playing the fiddle at local dances and celebrations. He developed a friendship with Claire Lake, another remarkable Aroostook County fiddler, and this relationship was instrumental in Simon's stylistic development.

As Simon's reputation as a fiddler grew, he began to be in demand at bluegrass and other music festivals. In 1983, he was honored by being awarded the prestigious NEA National Heritage Fellowship.

Simon is survived by his wife of 64 years, Simone (Fradette), and by three children, nine grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

# RALPH STANLEY II RECORDS STAN KEACH/RICK LANG SONG

On Boot Hill, a song written by Stan Keach of Maine and Rick Lang of NH, is the third cut on Ralph Stanley II's new CD, Ralph Stanley II and the Clinch Mountain Boys (Stanley Family Records), released May 26, 2017.

Ralph II is the son of legendary bluegrass/mountain music pioneer Ralph Stanley, who died in 2016 after almost 70 years in the music, first as a member of The Stanley Brothers (1947 to 1966), and then as Ralph Stanley and the Clinch Mountain Boys (1966-2016).

Ralph II has inherited the name "Clinch Mountain Boys," fulfilling his father's wish; this CD is the younger Stanley's first album with the "Clinch Mountain Boys" name attached to it. Ralph Stanley II has a growing following, six solo CDs as well as a highly acclaimed duet album with his father (Side By Side), a busy touring schedule, and has already had two Grammy nominations for earlier projects.

The current personnel of the Clinch Mountain Boys consists of Ralph II on guitar, Alex Leach on banjo, previous Clinch Mountain Boys member John Rigsby on mandolin and fiddle, and Noah Brown on upright bass.

Stan Keach, of Rome, who currently plays with the Sandy River Ramblers, the Sandy River 3, and Stan & Dan, has written many songs for well-known bluegrass bands, with cuts by James King, Audie Blaylock & Redline, Danny Paisley & the Southern Grass, Special Consensus, and The Gillis Brothers, among others.

Rick Lang, of Kingston, NH, is a well-known bluegrass songwriter who has had cuts by Larry Stephenson, Lonesome River Band, Illrd Time Out, Donna Ulisse, Front Range, and many others.

# My Bluegrass Journey

My bluegrass journey has been nothing less than amazing. My father and mother, Tom and Jo Prindall, along with many others you will meet in this article, were on the ground floor of bluegrass music in the state of Maine. I was quite young when a man playing a five string banjo came into our lives. I may be slightly off on some of the dates as I was so young; I will do my best to remember things accurately. The man with the banjo was Jimmy Cox. Jimmy and many other area musicians would come to our house on Saturday night for what I learned later to be "jam sessions". This went on for many years in the late 1950's and early 1960's. Jimmy and Dad built Dad's first banjo in our kitchen. I still can see them sitting at the table putting it together. This was the start of our life in bluegrass music.

In the mid to late 1960's a group that included Jimmy Cox, Tom Prindall, Charlie Gilliam (known as Coastline Charlie), Dick Gilmore, Smokey Val, Bill Ankatell, would form Maine's first bluegrass association, "The Pine Tree Bluegrass Music Association"; it was listed on the Federal Associations List. The Association promoted and organized the first all-bluegrass shows in Maine, held at Gibson Hall on the Bowdoin College Campus one Sunday per month fall through spring. These shows grew rapidly, with the hall having standing room only after just a few shows. I was the youngest person involved, and I able to attend all the meetings, which now I am so glad I was allowed to do. I was also the youngest performer, playing bass for the Prindall Family Band at the age of 15. I had been playing bass for 3 years, starting on stage at the age of 12. After a few shows we were able to start bringing in more New England bands: Bob and Grace French and the Rainbow Valley Folks, Sam Tidwell and Fred Pike (no Kennebec Valley Boys yet), Joe Val, Don Stover from West Virginia, to name a few. As a few years went by, White Mountain Bluegrass made appearances as well. Maine talent was growing, with Allen "Mac" Machale, Al Hawks, Timmy Farrell, The Fort Knox Volunteers, and Smokey Greene, from New York. Again I am only naming a few of many. By the end of the 1960's and the beginning of the 1970's, bluegrass music had left its mark on Maine and was here to stay.

I am not sure of the year-- perhaps early 1970 -- Jimmy Cox organized the first one-day bluegrass festival at Meadowbrook Camping Area in Phippsburg, Maine, I believe he had three festivals there, altogether. Those festivals were met with promising fan numbers that grew each year. Then Jimmy and the board of the Pine Tree Bluegrass Music Association, with Fred Pike and Sam Tidwell now serving on the board, promoted at least 3 one-day festivals starting in 1974 at the Boothbay Railway Museum. These one-day festivals soon gave ground to the now very popular weekend festivals, during the 70's and 80's, these festivals grew

at a feverish rate, starting with The Yonder Hill Campground Salty Dog Festival in Skowhegan, Maine, run by Sam Tidwell and Fred Pike. This festival launched the type of festivals we see today. Many bands that are still active today played this festival, and many that are no longer active: Jimmy Cox, Kennebec Valley Boys, The Prindall Family, Bob and Grace French, Don Stover, Joe Val were familiar bands on every playbill. Over the years many new Maine bands, including the Danville Junction Boys, even Judd Strunk and Dick Curless, joined the lineup. By the late 70's new talent was popping up everywhere. The Morse Brothers, Brian Mason, Evan Fitch, Addy Saunders -- this is just scratching the surface of talent. It sure seemed like it was time for one huge festival, but where would we do that? Tom Prindall along with Richard Schwartz went to Patti Crooker with an idea to run a festival at Thomas Point Beach and she agreed. We all know how great this turned out; what a festival!!!

The dedication and hard work done by all involved is unsurpassed. Many of these entertainers and musicians of the early years have gone to the Great Bluegrass Festival in the Sky, leaving a legacy for us all. The music they all loved so dearly is now on the fast lane. Honestly, I think all of us thought we were in for a bigger struggle and we were prepared for that. The music meant for families is here to stay. During the 80's many bands started working in Maine, with fresh faces, and so much talent came to light it's almost hard to imagine. Each one has left a mark on this wonderful industry that has been so much a part of my entire life. I feel so blessed and privileged to have known each and every one, and to have shared music and laughter and a bond that can't be described. I ask each and every bluegrass lover to attend a festival; after the stage show is finished, camp fires are blazing, and field picking is at top speed, sit a moment and listen to the music floating to the heavens -- take in the most peaceful feeling in the world. Thanks to all the pioneers who gave their heart and soul to keep this music alive, helping it thrive. This is what they all did it for - the love of bluegrass music. May it go on and on and never die.

Here are the memories of a bluegrass kid, involved from the ground floor up. What a wonderful ride! Many blessings to you all.

## MISTY MOUNTAINEERS SCHOOL PROGRAM

Schools are always on the lookout for quality extra-curricular educational opportunities for their students. Early this year the Misty Mountaineers got to present an Introduction to Bluegrass for several hundred MSAD 54 fifth and sixth graders at the Skowhegan High School auditorium.

When we accepted the gig it became immediately clear that the kids weren't the only ones who would be learning something new. Putting together a program for eleven and twelve-year-olds that would inform and entertain and hold their interest turned out to be quite a challenge. Here's how it went.

Our contact person was the Arts in the Schools Coordinator and Theatre Director, the perfect person for us to communicate with. She surprised us, saying the school had never had a bluegrass act perform. Our charge was to introduce the genre, involve the kids and entertain them at the same time. The job would certainly require a lesson plan.

Our first objective was to figure out what level of experience kids that age have in music at school (since none of could remember that far back) and try to find some common ground to build on. We began with the instruments themselves, a basic demonstration of how stringed instruments make tone, and how fingers and frets combine to change tone to make notes. Then each instrument got a brief introduction and demonstration, followed by an instrumental that featured a solo on each instrument.

From there we employed a simple historical timeline, telling about where the music came from, what made it different and unique, who the founders and early popular artists were, and how the music was presented.

Bluegrass harmony is unique, so we talked about that, and we also wanted to introduce the social aspect of the music: festivals, pickin' parties, jams, open mic's etc. — things that are everywhere if you want to find an opportunity to play music outside of school. We provided a handout for distribution that included websites (BMAM's of course), web links of all kinds, history and library references, Maine festival websites and more.



The format we settled on was to begin with a couple of standards and then talk for a minute or so; then demonstrate what we'd just talked about with the next song; build on that information in the next minute of talk; do another song to reinforce that... and so on.

I'll confess, we were really careful with the set list. Some lyrics about the "usual subjects" didn't seem appropriate for that forum, so we vetted every song with that in mind.

At the end of the "show" we invited a Q&A, which would have worked better if the questions were easier for everyone, including us, to hear. We'll address that next time.

The kids were an amazing audience. They were infinitely curious, totally attentive and always responsive, not to mention well behaved. I know I can speak for the band when I say it was an awesome gig to begin the 2017 season.

## JOE KENNEDY BIOGRAPHY

Joe can trace his love of bluegrass music back to the Dirt Band's Will the Circle Be Unbroken album in the early 1970's. When he moved to Washington County in 1974 he discovered harmonica playing Charlie McCoy, a well-respected, much sought after Nashville studio musician. Charlie did for the harmonica what Jerry Douglas did for the resonator guitar. His style of playing was meant for country and bluegrass and Joe ate it up. A friend introduced him to the current bluegrass scene in Maine and different styles of the music.

Years of practicing landed him jobs with down east country bands. He eventually started going to bluegrass festivals in the northeast, and in some southern states. In 1980, at a picking party in Maine, Joe met some members of the Bluegrass Supply Company and joined the band. Before long the band was performing at all the Maine festivals, recording, competing and touring.


In 1985 the first Breakneck Mountain bluegrass festival was held at Joe's homestead in Crawford ME. Joe married Nellie Kennedy in 1986 and together they promoted

the festival for ten years. During that time Joe performed and recorded with the Kennebec Valley Boys (playing electric bass), Breakneck Mountain, and, along with Nellie, Evergreen. Evergreen endured for twenty-two years and recorded 5 CDs.

In 1995 Al Hawkes invited Joe and Nellie to join the steering committee for the soon to be Bluegrass Music Association of Maine. By the next year the BMAM was incorporated and Joe was its first Chairman of the board. Twenty-two years later Joe is still a member. While serving he established the long running Northern Jam, started a benefit concert series, the Maine Pioneers Awards Show and, as the BMAM Historian, heads the Archive Committee.

In 2014 Joe and Nellie were inducted into the Maine Country Music Hall of Fame. Joe currently serves on the board of the MCMHOF Museum.

Joe is a member of the Wayside Grange in Dexter, ME where their fifth concert season is just getting started.



# **BMAM Eastern Jam**

May 7, 2017 was the last date for this season at the BMAM Eastern Jam at the Grange in Brewer. It wasn't planned as a celebration of our 4th season, but it felt like one because Ken and Jane Brooks returned to do a follow-up bluegrass jam workshop and then stayed and picked with us all day! A good way to end a season thank you Ken and Jane for sharing your talent, experience, friendliness, and love of music with us.

From October 2016 to May 2017, the jams fell on good weather days, with no storms -what are the chances of that? That allowed our distant travelers to get here and gave us an average of about 50 people attending each jam - pickers and listeners included. Each month at least a couple of new people attended, bringing their enthusiasm for bluegrass music. Thanks to all who attended and lent their support - helping all levels of players figure out how to join in, no matter how skilled. That was one of Ken's themes - how to play back-up for a singer or solo instrumentalist, how to use dynamics (quiet and louder) for the benefit of the jam, how to know when you are ready to lead a song, etc.

The volunteers at the Eastern Jam make everything possible - Sandra and Carl Moon arrive real early on Sundays to cook for the concessions; Dolores helps run the concessions; Debbie Lancaster, Berta Fleming, Annette Stover, and Dianne Darling take in the entry fees and sign up new BMAM members; Dale Canning has lent us a bass; Al Ashley provided the sound system for singers upstairs; and Evan Richert helped greet (and lug jamrelated materials each month from home to the Grange and back). Thank you to the volunteers and to all participants - and see you next fall!




