

THE MISTY MOUNTAINEERS RETIRE AFTER LONG SUCCESSFUL RUN

After 43 years of continuous high class bluegrass entertainment in Maine, the Misty Mountaineers have announced their retirement as a band. Led from its inception by Wilf Clark, The Misty Mountaineers (known at times as the Misty Mountain Review, and more recently as Wilf Clark and the Misty Mountaineers) has been a top tier bluegrass act at Maine and New England bluegrass festivals and other venues. Up until the retirement announcement, the Misty Mountaineers has been, in recent years, the longest-continuous-running bluegrass act in Maine (the "longest-running" title now falls to this writer's band, the Sandy River Ramblers; we accept the honor with humility and will dedicate ourselves to trying to live up to the legacy left us by Wilf and the Mountaineers.)



The band was formed by Wilf Clark in 1975. The first edition consisted of Gene Rumery, banjo; Bob Fletcher, upright bass; Chris Anthony, guitar; and Wilf, mandolin. Their first public performance was at the All Maine Co-operative Old-Time Jamboree 75, on June 22, 1975, at the Athens Fairgrounds.

Wilf offers the following description of the band's origin. "Gene Rumery approached us about playing some music. Bob was in a small band at Unity College at the time, playing bass. Bob and I worked for Chris, and he had a Martin guitar, so we asked him to jam with us. I only played guitar, so I was assigned to learn the mandolin. I borrowed one from Greg Boardman and started playing it. I Actually played it on stage at our first show in Athens a few months after I picked it up. I named the band the Misty Mountaineers because a cloud of mist encompassed the top of St. Albans Mountain one day as I was returning to town. Bob and I shared a cabin in that area that we called the Misty Mountain Mansion."

Wilf, of course, is the son of legendary yodeling singing cowboy Yodeling Slim Clark, and Wilf has certainly carried on the tradition of providing fine acoustic music in the northeast. Through the years, almost 50 different musicians have graced the stage as full-time or fill-in Mountaineers. Only Wilf has been a member of every edition of the Misty Mountaineers. After Wilf's 43-year membership, the next longest running members are guitarist Bernie Staples (15 years) and Wilf's longtime partner, the late Dotty Farrell, one of the most respected upright bass players in Maine acoustic music (12 years).



Indeed, the list of Mountaineers reads like a Who's Who of bluegrass music in Maine. Following is a list of musicians who have graced the stage with the Misty Mountaineers since 1975. (O) denotes original member; (A) denotes 4 or more years as a member; * denotes stand in; (F) denotes a member of the final edition of the band in fall of 2018.

It should be mentioned that two full-time Misty Mountaineers (Nellie Kennedy and Perley Curtis), and 3 fill-in Mountaineers (Fred Pike, Sam Tidwell, and Ken Brooks), are members of the Maine Country Music Hall Of Fame.


Wilf credits Eric Boothroyd with being one of the most important figures in the development of the band. "Eric helped me immensely in developing both as a band leader, and in creating the overall sound of the band by his skills as a musician, entertainer, and by his keen sense of harmony singing. His mentoring helped several other careers because of his ability to sing all the harmony parts and teach them. Without him, I more than likely would never have continued as long as I did."

The Misty Mountaineers have played almost all the bluegrass festivals in Maine over the years: Salty Dog, Sam Tidwell's, Breakneck Mountain, Thomas Point Beach, Oxford, White's Beach, Blistered Fingers, and County, as well as the big Red Clay Festival in PEI, and the main stage at the Joe Val Festival in Massachusetts. They've also played many other great

venues: St. Albans Jamboree, the Egg Festival, county fairs in Maine and Massachusetts, and many others. They've appeared on the Exit 13 TV show on channel 12, and they've won top bluegrass honors in all the Maine Country Music Association competitions, as well.

Wilf and the Misty Mountaineers have also given bluegrass a big boost in Maine by hosting concerts that featured national bluegrass stars Danny Paisley and the Southern Grass (along with special guest James King), and the Earl Brothers from California. The band also hosted a concert that featured nationally famous country/folk-rock star Dave Mallett.

Since 2000, Wilf and the Mountaineers have hosted an annual Yodeling Slim Clark Scholarship concert, which provides a \$1,000 scholarship every year to a student at Nokomis High School who is



Wilf has always had the reputation of being a very nice man, with a sharp sense of humor, and those who've played with him know him as a great bandleader and musical colleague. I've known Wilf since 1981, have shared the stage with him many times, and my interactions with him have always been extremely positive and heartwarming. The year Liz and I were Misty Mountaineers — along with Wilf, Dotty and Jim Smith — was one of the most fun and fulfilling years I've spent in bluegrass music. Wilf was always quick to praise band members, and he always tried to let everyone be a "star of the show." Wilf was also enthusiastic about having our daughter Carrie and Jim's son Jay, both young fiddlers, come on stage for a number or two, which was very thoughtful and reinforcing — to Carrie and Jay and to us, their parents. A couple of years after our tenure with the band, Jay became a full-time Misty Mountaineer, and it helped him to develop into one of the finest bluegrass fiddlers to come out of Maine.

Since my term with the band ended, Wilf has continued to perform several of my original songs regularly, and I've been very grateful to him for that, although I probably haven't expressed my appreciation strongly or often enough. Well, let me do that now —thanks so much for singing my songs, Wilf! It's meant a lot to me.

As I write this article, I am reminded of different aspects of the legacy of Wilf Clark and the Misty Mountaineers. Not only has Wilf always provided wholesome and entertaining bluegrass music shows to his many fans, but he's also helped to develop the careers, reputations, and skills sets of many, many musicians of all ages, many of whom have gone on to contribute their musical gifts to Maine, and other places, too. Today, former Misties Perley Curtis and Jay Smith both work out of Nashville, the country music capital of the world.

43 years of first-rate bluegrass music, 49 musicians contributing to the whole — that's a lot! Thanks for everything, Wilf! And thanks, too, to all the members of the Misty Mountaineers over the years. We will miss seeing and hearing the Misty Mountaineers, and they will be fondly remembered for a long, long time!

Lois Savage Gelina Music Biography

I've been around bluegrass and country music all my life. I remember my father, Jim Savage, playing guitar and singing since I was a little girl. When we lived in Connecticut, my dad used to play and jam with the Pike Brothers (Fred and Earl) and Sam Tidwell. In 1969 we moved to Maine and in the early 70's my dad bought me a bass and I learned how to play with some instruction from Dick Pelletier. Towards the late 70's I went to my first Bluegrass Festival at Yonderhill Campground in Skowhegan. Over the years, I have performed in many bluegrass bands. My first band was The Blinnhill Travelers with my dad and my youngest brother, Carlton, and some family friends. Then in the early 80's I moved on to form one of the youngest bluegrass groups in Maine at the time, Blinnhill Bluegrass, with Dale and Gail Hodgdon, Gary Pomerleau, my brother Carlton Savage and myself. In 1983 and 84 I was asked to join a Vermont based bluegrass band called Green Mountain Bluegrass with Stan and Dan Tyminski and Jim and David Bevins. Over the years I've had the privilege to perform with many Maine bluegrass greats such as Bob and Grace French, The Prindall Family, The Danville Junction Boys, Bobby Carter, Brian Mason and Bub Cooper to name a few. In 1987, I promoted the Blinnhill Bluegrass Festival at the Topsham Fairgrounds in Topsham, Maine bringing in national, regional and local acts. During the Ice Storm of 1998 my husband, Brian Gelina, and I formed a bluegrass group with Brian Mason and Bub Cooper called Traditional Heights. And during that time, I worked with the Detroit Snowmobile Club to promote the Detroit Bluegrass Festival for many years. There were also many bluegrass concerts, shows and benefits that we as Blinnhill Productions promoted throughout the 1990's and 2000's. As our children grew older we also performed as The Gelina Family and currently perform with Gail and Gordon Pike as Gelina and Pike's Mainely Grass. Throughout the years I have held many positions on the board and committees in BMAM, DECMA and MCMA music associations and look forward to participating once again on the BMAM board.

BACK TO BASICS CALLS IT QUITS AFTER 25 YEARS

After over 25 years of playing bluegrass music, the Brunswick area band, Back To Basics, has announced that they are no longer accepting bookings. For the past few years, Back To Basics has consisted of the following musicians: Gene Groves, Lead Guitar Vocals; Brian Daniels, Mandolin, Guitar Vocals; Eben Greenleaf, Banjo; Bernie Coombs, Bass; Ray Berard, Guitar Vocals. Back To Basics was an enthusiastic and entertaining band; they will certainly be missed by the many fans they made in Maine and in other northeastern states and Canada. The band released two recordings: Some Things Never Change (1994) and Havin' More Fun Than Normal Folks (1999). The following statement was posted on Facebook by Back To Basics on December 2, 2018, as this issue of The Bluegrass Express was going to press ...

When we decided to put this band together over 25 years ago, the thought at the time was to perform at a few local festivals or gatherings. Little did we know it wouldn't be long before we were being asked to play at so many festivals and events throughout the North East and into Canada.

It has been an honor that we have been able to perform on so many stages including some of bluegrasses biggest venues. We will be forever grateful to all of the promoters that gave us the opportunity to be a part of their events. The times we shared with the local talent, along with regional and national touring bands, will always be treasured. We would like to thank everyone that has performed with BTB, from the original members that included (the late) Evans Fitch, Butch Deforge, along with Jim Warren "who replaced Evans" and was with us for many years. We would also like to thank the many fine musicians that have stood in with us from time to time. We can't forget to mention our wives and girlfriends that have stood by us all of these years allowing us to do what we love.

Last but not least we would like to thank all of our loyal fans that have followed and supported us throughout the years, along with the new ones that we have recently gained. If it wasn't for all of you we never would have been able to do what we have done. Your support is greatly appreciated, as we continue to support the festivals, the bands, the venues, as we are looking forward to attending as many events as possible.

As most of you know, we have scaled back from performing the last few years due to several reasons and our feelings now are that we can no longer give our best performance. To continue to perform, would not be fair to you as fans or the promoters. So as a collective unit it has been decided that the time has come not to accept any more bookings.



Archive Committee Report December 2018

A huge thank you to Mr. Stan Hallett for his generous donation to the BMAM archives project. Stan Hallett, a veteran from Readfield, Maine, is a longtime fan, musician and early supporter of bluegrass in Maine. I received a call from Stan earlier this year and he told me about all the items he had collected over many decades. Because of a recent move to a much smaller house he decided it was time to donate his collection to BMAM. As I look at our new magazine collection I realize that we have a complete course in bluegrass music history!
