ROCK HEARTS PERFORM FOR A SOLD OUT CROWD AT CENTER THEATRE, DOVER/FOXCROFT

Bill Thibodeau was born in Rhode Island. His folks. Sam and Eddie Thibodeau, yearned to move to Maine when he was still quite young. He grew up in a musical family in Cambridge, just down the road from where I now live. Sam was performing a lot as co-founder of Fred Pike, Sam Tidwell & the Kennebec Valley Boys and the house was full of music. By his teens, Bill was already a good picker. After graduating from Guilford High School he joined the U.S. Air Force. When he returned home he made a point to make it in the bluegrass music world. While in Maine, Bill made many friends from his many years of performing, teaching and promoting.

Several years ago Bill decided he had more opportunities in Rhode Island and moved back there. Compared to rural Central Maine, he



knew musical opportunities would be better. He met Alex McLeod and the Rock Hearts band got started. Nellie and I watched their showcase performance at the Joe Val Festival and we knew he had finally found what he wanted. The band was really good!

We saw them again at the 2021 Blistered Fingers festival and I told them I would set up a show for them in Central Maine. I was currently booking acts for my Grange in Dexter. Because of the pandemic the Grange partnered with the larger, newly renovated Center Theatre. We booked Rock Hearts for October 29th. We had plenty of time to promote and a lot of help. The band was great to work with and did a great job of promoting the show. Also, Bill has many friends, fans and family in the area. Reservations started to trickle in. By September we had sold over 150 tickets and were cautiously optimistic for a good crowd. The theatre has about 250 seats. A week before the show, we had close to 200. Everybody was talking about it and we urged all that were thinking of purchasing at the door to call for reservations. When the doors opened, the line of people waiting stretched down the street. People were still coming in when we got word that all seats were sold. Nobody was left out as we managed to squeeze in more chairs from the lobby.

So the hall was packed. It's a great feeling to stand on stage and see such a wonderful crowd. The band gave the audience what they craved and the audience gave back love. It was a great show! Thank you Rock Hearts, Center Theatre, Wayside Grange Theatre, McKusick Petroleum and all the bluegrass fans that attended the show!

I have booked Rock Hearts back for October 21st 2023. I would like to use the show as a fundraiser for BMAM.

SANDY RIVER RAMBLERS REACH 40TH YEAR PLAYING BLUEGRASS MUSIC IN MAINE

As we enter the year 2023, the Sandy River Ramblers begin their 40th continuous year of playing bluegrass music in Maine. It seems appropriate to celebrate. As far as I know, we're the second Maine bluegrass band to reach forty years, the Misty Mountaineers being the first to reach that mark.

Things don't always turn out the way you expect them to go. When Liz and I moved to Maine in 1981, we had played in three different bluegrass bands in seven years, so we figured that was the usual way. We started playing with Sam Tidwell as soon as we arrived in Maine, but when Sam moved to Rhode Island three years later, we started playing a few local gigs with Bud Godsoe and Ron Sicina as the Sandy River Ramblers. Suddenly I find that it's 40 years later, and the band is still going strong; we just having finished playing a busy summer schedule, we have a large and loyal fan base, and we've had steady CD sales!

Naturally, we've had some personnel changes over the years. Bud, a charter member, is still a Rambler (he "retired" from music for a year or two, but otherwise, he's been a Rambler all along). After 30+ years as a Rambler, Liz was finally forced into retirement by shoulder issues. I've been a Rambler, without a break, for the full 40 years, and I'm mighty proud of it.

When the Ramblers started, I was writing a lot of songs, and I knew I wanted to play a lot of original songs in the band. Our first cassette album, *North Woods Cabin*, was all original songs. Our second album, *Welcome to Maine*, was all songs about Maine, mostly originals. That project (about 1987?) launched us into the niche we have occupied ever since — specializing in songs about Maine topics.

We've had many fine musicians in the band, including, in the first three decades of the band (pre-2012), Carol Johnson, the great Bill Smith, Ellen Bowman, Dave Clapp, Carrie Keach, and Dan Simons. Sam Tidwell played quite a few shows with us in the 1980s, as well.

Around 1995, the band consisted of Liz, Bud, me and Bill Smith on mandolin. We were going strong, with lots of shows and a CD album, *Elvis is Alive (and Singing Bluegrass)*. That period was one of the high-points of the first two decades of the Sandy River Ramblers. Then Bud retired for a while, and Bill left to start North Star, and the Ramblers went into a period of decline for a while.

In about 2006 to 2010, the band was in a low-activity mode, only playing 6-to-12 shows a year. Liz and I were directing a lot of attention toward other things. Our daughter, Carrie, was becoming a highly-skilled fiddler but, al-though she did play some Sandy River Ramblers shows, she was primarily a Celtic fiddler; so Liz and I built a contra dance band (The Kennebec Highlands String Band) around her, and we also played out as a family trio quite a bit. When Carrie went to college, Dan Simons, a key member of the contra dance band as well as the Sandy River Ramblers, moved away for a few years. Liz and I also joined the Misty Mountaineers for a few months, which put the SRR on the back burner.

Simultaneous to the semi-hibernation of the Ramblers, I had started, in 2009, a youth band, the Maranacook String Band, as part of the gifted/talented education program at Maranacook Community School. Within a year of its inception, the MSB, which featured two outstanding teenaged singers — Julie Davenport and Lee Stetson — was quite good, and we started playing paid gigs. We also started putting on concerts, in grange halls and community centers, that featured the youth band and the "grown-up" band (Sandy River Ramblers) together on the same bill. Dan Simons, now a highly-skilled mandolinist and vocalist, moved back to Maine and was immediately a key player in both bands (Dan being a graduate of Maranacook). Bud and Liz would help out the MSB as needed. This 2-band collaboration was a real boost to the Ramblers, and pushed us into a second golden age.

Over the years, we had sold 2 or 3 thousand copies of the *Welcome to Maine* cassette album, but by 2012, cassettes were passe, so I wanted to record a new CD version; in the meantime, I had written some new songs about Maine. The Maranacook String Band had recorded a CD in 2010, which Ramblers Bud and Liz helped record, so we Ramblers had all re-acquired the recording bug. We put out the new album, *Cry of the Loon and other original songs about Maine*, in 2011, with input from the Ramblers (Liz, Bud, Dan and me) and the String Band.

We sold a lot of copies of that album, not only at our shows, but in many stores which sold Maine-themed gifts, and in a few sporting camps and Mom and Pop stores in vacation-oriented towns, as well.

We had recruited fiddling wunderkind Jay Smith to play with both the String Band and the Ramblers, and Jay really shined on the *Loon* CD project.

KENNEDYS AND BROOKS VISIT GRACE FRENCH

Ken & Jane Brooks and Joe & Nellie Kennedy visited and played music for Grace French in November at Grace's family farm in Cambridge, Maine. Grace is doing well and is now in her 90's. She is as feisty as ever and really enjoyed the music; actually



joining in singing on a couple of songs and even spontaneously adding her famous train whistle. Her daughter, Jeanne, was visiting from Singapore and took the photo. We all had a wonderful time. Grace splits her time between Cambridge and Nashua, New Hampshire with her son, John.

Grace and her late husband, Bob, played bluegrass music throughout New England starting in the1950's and moved to Maine in the 1970's. Their band, Bob French & the Rainbow Valley Boys & Sweetheart (and Grace still is!) performed with various musicians over the years including Peter Rowan who acknowledged them during his acceptance speech at the IBMA Awards Show in 2022 when he was inducted into the Bluegrass Music Hall of Fame as his first band gig in Massachusetts where they all lived at the time. Bob & Grace have been recognized by various organizations and Halls of Fame throughout the country and were inducted into the Maine Country Music Hall of Fame & Museum in 2008.

MERVIN LITTLEFIELD

Long time Maine bluegrass supporter, Mervin Littlefield, 86, passed away on November 23, 2022 at his home in Bangor. He was born in Milo, ME, grew up in Medford, and then moved to Dover-Fox-croft with his family, graduating from Foxcroft Academy. His later years were spent in the Bangor area where he worked for Bangor Hydro Electric Company and retired.

Mervin started playing guitar at an early age and was an accomplished bluegrass picker. He knew the words to countless songs and attended many festivals. He always said "There is bluegrass and then that other stuff!" Mervin was very fond of jamming and could often be found at jam sessions in the Bangor/Brewer area. Laurie Littlefield-Baas, his daughter and long time member of BMAM, has many fond memories of attending these with her father.

The Marancook String Band broke up in fall, 2011, as key members went off to college, but with the new album, and with Jay's fiddling, the Ramblers were alive and well, playing more shows than they had in years. As Maranacook String Banders, we had gotten into the habit of booking concert halls and community centers to produce our own shows, and we kept doing that with the Ramblers. Julie Davenport, featured MSB vocalist, was at UMO — not too far away — and she "graduated" to the "grown-up band." Simultaneously, Liz's shoulders were hurting, so Julie started learning to play the bass in earnest. Within a year or so, she was a solid bass player, and the full-time bassist for the Ramblers.

The Maranacook String Band had a brief revival after fall 2011, when 14year-old Dana Reynolds, another youthful Maranacook School vocal prodigy, started singing with what was left of the group, but Dana soon joined the Ramblers and the MSB was fully and permanently retired, and we put full emphasis on the Ramblers.

With Bud on banjo, Jay on fiddle, and Dan, who had become an exceptional mandolinist and vocalist and who has outstanding stage presence, handling the lead instrumental duties, we were in good shape. The vocal trio of Julie, Dana and me, with frequent vocal contributions from Bud and Dan as well, also served us well, I believe.

The 2012 Ramblers, with Julie, Dana, Bud, Fiddler Finn Woodruff, and me, recorded another CD, called *Home in the Heart of Maine*, comprising all original songs about Maine.

Jay Smith was the first of a series of really world-class fiddlers that were key factors in the revival and development of the Sandy River Ramblers during the 2012-to-2022 decade. When Jay moved to Nashville to play music full-time, he was replaced by Max Silverstein, a wonderful young fiddler, who eventually went to bluegrass college and now plays with Seth Mulder & Midnight Run, one of the top new bands in bluegrass. The next Rambler fiddler was Finn Woodruff, whose short but dazzling fiddle career was cut short by a tragic fatal kayaking accident — a terrible loss. Brendan Hickey, a recent Berklee College of Music graduate, is carrying on the tradition of great young SRR fiddlers. Brendan has turned out to be an outstanding singer, as well, rounding out the trio. The Sandy River Ramblers have been very blessed to experience the stunning development of these four great fiddlers.

The Ramblers have only had two banjo players. During Bud's brief retirement it was Bill Smith, arguably Maine'd best bluegrass musician ever, who had been playing mandolin with us; other than that brief period, it's been Bud, and he's been a solid banjoist for 40 years, and just the kind of banjoist the band has needed. Bud learned to play while working on the Alaska pipeline back in the 70s, spending hours under the midnight sun studying with the Earl Scruggs book. Since he's been a Rambler, he's studied the Stanley approach to the banjo, and his playing is an amalgam of the Scruggs and Stanley styles. Style-wise, the Sandy River Ramblers have always been ultra traditionalists, though more than half of our repertoire consists of original songs. I've had many of my original songs recorded by top-notch bluegrass acts, mostly very traditional bands like Danny Paisley, James King, Audie Blaylock, Ralph Stanley II, and Rock Hearts. Most of the original songs the Ramblers do are about Maine topics, but if you ignore the words (which I hope you don't) you might think they're bluegrass songs from the 1950s. (There are exceptions – the Ramblers feature a lot of comedy in our shows, and our comedy songs are generally not traditional bluegrass songs.)

Mandolinist Bobby St. Pierre has been playing with us for about a year now, and he fits in perfectly. A former teenaged protege of Jimmy Cox, Bobby has had a long and notable career playing with the likes of Cox, Bob and Grace French, and North Star. Simply put, he's a traditionalist, and a virtuoso — a much-emulated mandolinist in Maine for over 40 years.


Julie Davenport, our bassist, is, in my opinion, the best bluegrass singer in Maine. As an eighth grader at Maranacook Community School, she impressed me so much in a school musical, and singing a Judds song in a talent show, that I started the Maranacook String Band as a way to put her singing before a wider audience. As good as she was back then, she's better now, and a rock-solid bassist, as well.

I should mention a few very talented musicians who have filled in for the Ramblers: banjo players Dave Kipputh, Dave Shaw, Carter Logan, Jeff Folger, Steve Peterson; fiddlers Ed Howe, Steve Muise, Silas Rogers, Megan Muther, Don LeBlanc; mandolinists Bill Thibodeau, Megan Muther, Jeff Trippe; bassist Lori Smith.

We were especially grateful to Sam Tidwell, who filled in on banjo, mandolin, fiddle, and even bass, at various times; he always added significantly to the show. And of course I want to mention Liz Keach, who is always there to do whatever needs doing on vocals, mandolin, bass; and Liz always contributes generously to things that need to be done off-stage to keep the band functioning smoothly. If I've forgotten someone, please forgive me. Filling in for the Ramblers is never an easy gig, owing to the fact that we do so many original songs, but these musician I've mentioned are all top-notch people, and they all did a great job for us, and we appreciate it very much.

What the Sandy River Ramblers try to do is put on a strong stage show featuring comedy, songs about Maine, finely-honed trio and quartet singing, and powerful traditional instrumental playing. Going into our 40th continuous year, we hope to keep doing it for a long time yet. To say that it's been fun doesn't come anywhere near doing it justice; we all have a deep love for the music. Playing with these terrific musicians and wonderful people has been a great honor for me, personally; I feel truly blessed for the privilege of experiencing a 40-year career with the Sandy River Ramblers.


