#### REMEMBERING BOB BOOTHBY

Bob Boothby, a well-loved and long-standing member of Maine's bluegrass community, passed away in early 2025 after a long illness.

Bob was one of the first bluegrass musicians Liz and I met in Maine. Soon after we moved here in 1981, he and bandmate Bruce Hobart came over to our house for a really fun fourperson jam. Over the years, we were always impressed by this: every bluegrass musician and fan really liked Bob a lot. Besides being a terrific banjo picker and baritone singer, he was one of the very nicest people around — upbeat, cheerful, always seemed sincerely interested in knowing how you were doing. He was one of those guys who seemed to like everybody. He enriched the bluegrass community a lot!

#### REBECCA BOOTHBY-CONLEY, BOB'S DAUGHTER...

My Dad, Banjo Bob Boothby, played 3 finger style banjo in the style of Earl Scruggs and he was a master at it. He played the very first bluegrass festival in Maine in 1972, playing with the Blue Grass Ridge Runners with Stan Hallett and Bob Murray. Throughout the 1970s and 80s, He played banjo with many bands including White Mountain Bluegrass, Al Hawkes, Mac McHale & the Old-Time Radio Gang, and the Danville Junction Boys.

Growing up, I have fond memories of The Danville Junction Boys weekly practice at our home in Auburn in the 1980s. Roll in My Sweet Baby's Arms, Foggy Mountain Breakdown, Flint Hill Special and Mountain Dew were some of my favorite songs that rang through the house. Ron Gallant, Bruce Hobart and John Sparrow were his pickin' buddies in the DJB and they would play, sing and laugh so hard all night, they always had a good time. Dad was the happiest when he was pickin' and singin' with his bluegrass buddies.

For six decades, Dad played almost every bluegrass festival in Maine either on stage or off, with many late-night pickin' jams. His banjo playing was the best. For the rest of my life, anytime I hear that distinct Scruggs style bluegrass banjo, I will be taken back to a place that is my home and my heart, my dad.

#### SK: Where are you from?

**JR:** I've been a Mainer most of my life; currently living in Wells since 1985.

# SK: How did you get into bluegrass music?

JR: Bob and Laure Philibert my Folks, played Classic Country, Bluegrass, and Canadian Maritime Music.

# SK: Who were your early musical influences? Who are your favorite musicians and bands?

JR: Mac Wiseman, Jim & Jesse, Bill Monroe, Flatt and Scruggs. First Generation Bands.

SK: Can you tell us about your 1 or 2 or 3 favorite mandolins? Same question for other instruments you play?

JR: I am fortunate to own a 1977 Paganoni Mandolin

built for Les Thompson — the Jimmy Goodreau. Gibson is good. Bass would be Kay M1, and I'm a Martin HD28 guy.

#### SK: What are some of the bands/acts you've played in over the years?

**JR:** Simon St Pierre, White Mountain Bluegrass, Mac McHale and The Old Time Radio Gang, Freewheelin', Southern Rail, Zink and Company and many more.

#### SK: What are a couple of your favorite shows you've ever played?

JR: Imperial Theater in Saint John, NB. Many Europe Countries, Caribbean, etc.

SK: Outside of bluegrass music, are there any other genres/styles of music you've played or enjoyed listening to?

JR: I do listen to all good music.

# RON GALLANT, GUITARIST, DANVILLE JUNCTION BOYS

Bob was a dear friend and outstanding band mate for many years. He was part of the early New England bluegrass scene with such luminaries as Fred Pike, Jimmy Cox, Smokey Val, etc. He was a great mentor to [Danville Junction Boys' mandolinist] Bruce Hobart and me as we were learning the genre. On banjo he could play it all, from Daybreak in Dixie to Alan Munde's Stymied, and he had a natural baritone voice that was perfect. I will miss him and consider myself blessed to have known him. Love ya, Bobby.

# JOHN SPARROW, BASSIST, DANVILLE JUNCTION BOYS

Bob and I both joined DJB in the early 1980s. From that point on our lives remained firmly connected as friends and musicians. On stage he dependably pumped out flawless Scruggs/Stanley style bluegrass on his well-worn Gibson "bow tie" banjo to provide tremendous drive to DJB's infamous full-speed-ahead performances. His playing was rock solid, and his friendship proved just as solid.

Bob loved jamming at festivals, frequently ignoring stage shows to better spend the time picking with friends. In his prime everyone at festivals appeared to know Bob, and vice versa. I always felt we could parachute him from an airplane anywhere east of the Mississippi and he would land within 50 miles of somebody he knew through bluegrass!!

Back in pre-video days Bob provided exciting opportunities for northern audiences to witness quality banjo playing. For example, young Eric Gibson (Gibson Brothers Band) had never seen a live bluegrass banjo player on stage until he watched Bob Boothby performing at an event in upstate New York. Quite likely Bob made a positive impression on that young lad!

Yes, no doubt many of my fondest memories are playing bluegrass with my good friend Bob, both during 12 years with DJB, and also at his annual July 4th parties on Coffee Pond.

One thing for sure: If there's any bluegrass jamming in the afterlife we all can rest assured "Banjo Bob" is now happily in the thick of it!!

#### MAINE COUNTRY MUSIC HALL OF FAME PRESENTS "UNPLUGGED" CONCERT


IN HARTLAND, APRIL 13







Also in the lineup this year will be Rhonda Vincent, Danny Paisley, Rock Hearts and local/regional bands Seth Sawyer, Back Woods Road, Beartracks, Hemingway Brothers, Hosmer Mountain Boys and Cedar Ridge. Check the website for schedules and more details.

The Blistered Fingers festivals are mid-sized festivals, and there is always a variety of food vendors on hand. Pat-kus Guitars and Rick's Musical Instruments also set up shop on festival grounds. Indoor bathrooms and free hot showers are always available. There's a large tent for shade in the stage area. A Kids Academy is another nice feature, and one that organizer Sandy Cormier says is part of the festival's efforts to foster "the future love of this music in our younger generation."





# Thomas Point Beach Bluegrass Festival: A Farewell and a Look Back

When I was asked to write something up for the Thomas Point Beach Bluegrass Festival, I knew it would be too long. How do you sum up 45 years? Too emotional. Indeed. Too personal. That is what Thomas Point Beach Bluegrass has always been. Personal. It's about the people.

Many of you know how the story began. In 1972, Pati Crooker Mulligan took over management of Thomas Point Beach from her parents Harry & Marion Crooker. This beautiful beach

and park on the coast of Brunswick, Maine was known as "the family-fun spot" and the "prettiest and cleanest park in New England." It was a gathering place for family and friends to come together. In that spirit, Pati had been looking to bring some signature events to the park, and took a leap of faith with help from the Prindle Family and held the first Thomas Point Beach Bluegrass Festival on Labor Day Weekend in 1979. It was small, and Pati never left the front gate, but it was a success and the start of something special.

I always had hoped Pati would write a book sharing the stories and the lore of the festival. The history has been written up in Bluegrass Unlimited and documented on the website (thomaspointbeachbluegrass.com) but like many long standing traditions we rely on the oral histories to keep the memories alive.

So many of you have shared your own Thomas Point Beach stories with me over the years. From first steps to wedding proposals, family reunions, first kisses, workshops, hot air balloon rides, swims across the bay, lobster feeds and oyster shucking, bingo games, marshmallow golf, autographs, Blue Angel flyovers, Pogey Fest, jams, and so, so much more. We all have tales to tell.

My own journey with the festival began when I was 16. Some memories in your life play back like a movie over and over in your mind. I guess that is how you know they were life-changing. I remember every detail of that interview with Pati in the summer of 1985; exactly what I wore, specific questions, meeting Jenna. I remember very vivid details of the little office in the Main Lodge where I would go on to spend many, many hours of my life. I began as a gift shop girl and went on over the years to do it all from mowing lawns and cleaning bathrooms to booking bands and emceeing. The good, the bad, the ugly, and the fantastic. I learned the lessons through the years.

My first festival, I worked the snack bar and the gate. I didn't hear much of the music, but I do remember the people. I remember checking people in, telling folks to slow down to that impossible 5 MPH speed limit, and the "Welcome Home." I watched the worries and stress of everyday life visibly melt away as campers pulled up to the gate.

Happy people would come proudly hold up that coveted wristband (more than once paid for in rolled change). On the inevitably rainy Labor Day Monday mornings I would sit on the porch of the yellow gate house waving folks out and keeping a list of comments about counting down the days until next year.



About 300 bands graced that little stage over the years. From Showcase Bands making their debuts to the Father of Bluegrass himself, Bill Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys (82, 83, 88, 89), bringing Thomas Point Beach into the national spotlight.

White Mountain Bluegrass was a staple at the festival playing from 1979-2008 and a reunion in 2014. The general rule was a band might be invited back two years in a row, but then we needed to switch things up, but the crowd demanded some bands

over and over and we were known to break our own rules.

Bands like The Del McCoury Band (20 years), The Gibson Brothers (19 years), and the Tennessee Mafia Jug Band (14 years) became fixtures on the line-up and forever friends. Curating a lineup will always be my favorite part of preparing for a festival, and although the stage show is the main event, the true heart of a festival is the crowd! The people who attend make it all worth it. There were many times in the history of the Thomas Point Beach Festival that the stage show took a pause. In 2003, Pati wanted a break after 25 years of running the festival and turned her attention to family. You all came anyway to camp and jam and just be together! The inaugural "Non-Fest" was born resulting in t-shirts to mark the occasion the following year. I am always amazed by the number of folks I run into on the grounds festival week who still don't know who the headliners are. They simply don't care. They were coming anyway to be together!

In 2008, Pati officially retired the event. For the next two years, with no line-up, the park was still full and the music played on. And then one day with Pati and Michael in the house kitchen she said to me "We were thinking we would just bring back a one-day thing. They are coming anyway, we might as well have a stage show. What do you think?" I was in a new job and focused on my family, but you didn't have to ask me twice. These were my people and this event meant the world to me. We spent the next few hours remembering, laughing, and brainstorming names to distinguish it from what had been. We landed on the "Thomas Point Beach Special" with a nod to the classic song "Orange Blossom Special." It probably comes as no surprise that the idea for a one day, smaller event quickly spiraled back into a traditional event that mirrored our previous years and we had five more years together.

In 2016 instead of a festival, we held a beautiful Celebration of Life for festival founder, Pati Crooker. With a moving beachfront service, the dedication of a mill-stone in her honor, and an open stage featuring tributes that included Dailey & Vincent, the park was again full of the music that we all loved and my heart was full of the abundant love you all brought.

The question on everyone's mind was, "What's next?" Ken Irwin, of Rounder Records, sat with me under the ice cream awning and talked about the importance of the event to the bluegrass world and the support we would have if we wanted to move forward.

Pati's son Michael and his wife Jen were now running the operations of the park and campground, and were weighing the future of the event. It didn't take long for us to conclude that together we should give it a go and for the past eight years we have done just that.

We have done our best to hold on to tradition, while putting our own stamp on things. Our goal has been to provide a

place for generations to come together to love and laugh and cherish this genre and each other. There are so many camping groups with people of all ages who gather together year after year in "their" spot for the week. Thomas Point Beach Bluegrass is the Lunn/ Lemieux clan who grew up as "part of the magic" and have been essential to making it all happen for so many years, the Manic Mountain Boys tucked into the woods famous for their antics, the White Mountain Bus parked for so many years near the osprey nest, the Greenwoods' High Tea on the circle, dinner at the Stillman's on site 3, Donna & Jerry parked right behind the stage, all our Canadian friends, the Estees, Fitzpatricks and Arsenaults spanning all 40 years, the Bellew family who grew to over 60 strong and continued the tradition for 36 years years honoring their father even after he had passed by still coming together, and each person who sat in the audience all these years. In this run, we even had our own "Non-Fest" in 2020 when we held a Covid-cation Bluegrass Camping Weekend. Social distanced of course!

2024 marked 45 years since that first bluegrass band played at TPB. It was also time for Michael and Jen to make the difficult decision to move on. Times change, business changes, and mother nature has taken its toll on the beach and the grounds. The park needs updates. Mr. Crooker told Pati years and years ago, you will know when it is time. And they did. The park is now owned by Modern American Campgrounds and they have plans to put in the kind of investment needed to restore the grounds and upgrade systems. I have had conversations with the new owner and he has shared that there may be a place for bluegrass at Thomas Point again, but it will not be this year and it's not clear what the format would be. As for just showing up to camp? I don't have that answer. They are currently not taking reservations yet for the season. I suggest checking their website regularly.

What I do know is that there is a void for so many of us. I get a call, text, or email almost daily asking, "What now?" That particular combination of the perfect venue, the special people, and excellent talent are a cherished memory. We are so lucky to have lived it and I personally have been honored to play a part in making it happen. I am grateful to my own family, my festival family and friends, and so many who have supported this event for so long.

So how do we keep the magic alive? We keep in touch, we keep supporting the genre, we attend shows, stream music, send cards, jam, reach out on social media, and we remember. The Thomas Point Beach Facebook Page will stay active as a place to share memories and support musicians and promote shows. Right now, I know there are bluegrass events being created with care. Go to them and see one another and tell the stories of Thomas Point Beach past. I plan to see you there!

#### BMAM'S FESTIVAL MEMORIES

We asked the BMAM Board for their best advice and most cherished memories from decades of festival- going. Here's what they had to say.

#### **Must-have festival items:**

- ♦ More chairs than you think you'll need
- A few chairs without armrests for picking
- ◆ Coffee (and travel mugs!)
- Earplugs to sleep soundly through late-night jams
- ◆ Layers! You must plan for every single type of weather.
- Extra strings for your instrument!

#### Best tips for a new festival-goer:

- Be open minded and not shy about joining a jam. (But make sure to "read" the jam before you dive in!)
- ◆ Take in as much of and festival as possible—the shows, booths, food trucks, jams, and everything else.
- ♦ Meet your picking neighbors, investigate new bands, and pick as much as you can.
- Get to know people! They're the heart of every event.

#### **Favorite festival memories:**

"Jamming with friends and band members off stage, including Michael Cleveland, Larry Sparks, Laurie Lewis, Katahdin Valley Boys, and Rock Hearts." – Hideaki Mizuno, Board Chair

"Our fun memory was at a June Blistered Fingers festival which was cold and windy with rain. My bride of 50+ years cuddled up with blankets and heavy jackets, still loving the bluegrass show. The show must go on!" – John McKusick, Board Member

"My favorite memory is 2008 when Pati gifted me a fiddle and Michael a guitar and she had her banjo. None of us knew how to play, but we learned a few notes that day so we could join the Del McCoury Band on stage for a song!" – Shari Elder, Board Member

"At the Whites Beach Festival, Union River Band was performing on stage. Muleskinner Blues was on the set list. When the band started playing it, a couple of people, who remain anonymous, dressed in a donkey costume and danced into the audience area. Their antics were priceless! Since 1999, Ossipee has been a mainstay for music lovers in Maine and beyond. Launched as a bluegrass festival, Ossipee has evolved to also include a heavy slate of roots and Americana artists from Thursday through Sunday. Festival organizers Bill Johnson and Molly McKenna have their ear to the ground for emerging artists and a knack for booking breakout performers like Billy Strings. Molly Tuttle and Sierra Farrell.

This year's festival features a hearty dose of bluegrass, with national acts such as AJ Lee & Blue Summit; Rob Ickes and Trey Hensley; and fan favorites Twisted Pine. Maine's bluegrass scene will be well represented with Breakin' Strings, the Hazel Project and Tricky Britches.

Always the last weekend in July at the Ossipee Valley Fairgrounds, the festival offers a lot more than main stage shows. Catch more intimate performances at Stage Too and the new riverside stage that debuted at last year's festival. The Brews & Bluegrass tent offers late-night

music with a rotating cast of all-star pickers. Don't miss the rollicking Dance Barn, which kicks off as the main stage ends. And, of course, you can find picking in campsites across the fairgrounds at all hours of the day. (Definitely keep an eye out for the quiet camping sections if 3 a.m. banjos aren't your cup of tea!)


Apart from the music, take advantage of the Ossipee River: Blow up an inner tube and have a lazy float from one end of the fairgrounds to the other. The festival also offers a large—and constantly evolving—midway with food vendors and sellers of everything from tie-dyed clothes to hand-carved artisanal wood products.













#### COUNTY BLUEGRASS FESTIVAL



County Bluegrass delivers more than a beautiful festival site in Aroostook County. The four-day festival delivers a heavy dosedoes of traditional bluegrass with a slate of artists from Tennessee to Canada.

This year's roster of national touring bands includes Carson Peters & Iron Mountain, Nick Chandler & Delivered, Serene Green. The Ruta Beggars are traveling north from Massachusetts, and Dobro great Ivan Rosenberg is crossing the border from New Brunswick. And of course there are several Maine bands on the bill, including Blistered Fingers, the LaClaires and Dirigo Strings.

Organizer Stev Rogeski suggests arriving on Wednesday to enjoy the festival's famous early-bird chicken barbecue and potluck dinner on Wednesday night. A unique feature of the County festival is the pole barn that houses the main stage and provides a comfortable covered seating area for the audience. So whatever Mother Nature sends to Aroostook County, the bluegrass will keep driving in Fort Fairfield.

#### **HELP WANTED** SUMMER CAMP FIDDLE/VIOLIN PLAYER(S)

Overnight children's summer camp in Maine seeking a summer camp counselor who plays fiddle or violin to play for nightly campfires.

Our children's camp does a lot of singing; we try to have a violin or fiddle player in the camp band. Violin/fiddle playing counselor would also participate in supervision of a camper cabin, and supervision of activities such as swimming, drama, kayaking, field sports, arts & crafts, etc. No experience necessary in anything except fiddle or violin. Counselors have some time most days to participate in activities such as swimming, sailing, wind-surfing, kayaking, and hiking. Free sailing and wind-surfing lessons available a few times each week.

**COMPENSATION:** Room & board included. Fiddle playing counselor would live in a cabin with campers & other counselors. One day off per week. Salary depends on experience. High school students usually earn \$500 per week. Fiddlers with 1-2 years of work or school after high school can earn \$700 per week. Fiddlers with 3-4 years work exp. after high school can earn \$800 per week.
